# **HENRY'S COMMENTS**



In tribute to the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the novel "The Universal Baseball Association, Inc." by Robert Coover (1968), I've decided to start an OOTP dynasty, using OOTP19, reimagining Henry J. Waugh's eight team league with new characters.

In this new adventure, the same eight teams will play out the same 56 seasons with **new** players. I'm extending the season from the original 80 games to 98 games (7 opponents x 14 games) and will increase the roster size from 21 players to 24. Financials will be handled under the

Reserve Clause, and few other game settings will be massaged to fit the scope of the book.

I will report on each of these first 56 seasons according to the following timetable...

Preseason, January through Opening Day Season, by Month (May-June-July-August) Postseason, by Month (September-October-November-December)

Each report will contain "Henry's Comments" which will be centered on the game mechanics including my settings, etc. and opinions of how the game might be improved – "League News" and "Team News" where the league will be followed, and stories will appear to add Coover's ambiance.

Once we get to season 57, I will then transition into telling the story of the dynasty in more detail; probably by week. This will also be a good time to eliminate the Reserve Clause and consider expansion.

#### Logos

The teams are fixed from the novel, but logos or mascots, of course, are never mentioned. If we are to assume that "Year 1" in the novel is 1901, we know logos weren't a "thing" back then. The Tigers had a poorly drawn 4 legged animal, as did the Cubs – but a bit fatter. I was tempted to not pay attention to logos at all, but I actually hate the default ones OOTP provides – and to be honest – didn't want to look at them. I also didn't want to have to worry about updating logos as the years went by rather wanting to concentrate more on the developing story.

### **TRADES**

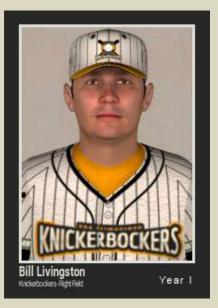

# THE TEAMS

#### 7/17/Year 0

Six months before the official opening of the league, Judge Thaddeus Gibson led a meeting of nine independent baseball teams at the Grand Renaissance Hotel. These teams were a combination of 3 barnstorming teams, 3 industrial teams, and 2 regional teams;

<u>Beaneaters</u>, local team, owned by Dave Adams(46), a tolerant and charitable person, but known for his meddling. The Beaneaters will likely in the top tier of the new UBA.

Manager – Ali Martines(41) Rep=Good

**Bridegrooms**, barnstormers, owned by Steve Erickson(58), a lenient and generous owner, with a hands off approach to the team. The Bridegrooms are top notch as far as talent and may be the team to beat in Year 1.

Manager – Josh Berry(37) Rep = Unproven

**Excelsiors**, industrial team, owned by Paul Eads(54) of Excelsior Rubber, an understanding man who is known to be a meddling economizer. As a result, the team may find it hard to compete in the early going of the UBA.

Manager – Bobby Kennaugh(33) Rep = Unproven

<u>Haymakers</u>, industrial team, owned by Jose Hernandez(54) of Farmer's Supply, a demanding, yet charitable owner who prefers to let the personnel on the field handle the team. The Haymakers should hold their own in the UBA.

Manager – Chris Webster(60) Rep = Good

**Keystones**, barnstormers, owned by Carlos Jaimes(50), a demanding economizer, but has a hands off approach to daily activities of the team. The Keystones are going to need some luck in this inaugural season.

Manager – Nick Elger(33) Rep = Unproven

<u>Knickerbockers</u>, local team, owned by Nazir Tanner(63), a demanding, yet charitable owner who prefers to let the personnel on the field handle the team. The Knickerbockers are a little short on

### **Baseball Cards**

I much prefer to use the Conlon baseball card format for my fictional leagues. Again, these card designs will remain constant. There are some samples in the center column.

# **Ballparks**

I will use much the same direction with my ballparks. I want to be able to spend most of my time developing the "story" of the league, and not be bogged down by the minor details.

My plan (once I get OOTP19) is to find 8 non-MLB ballparks that more-orless represent mid-century construction (or as close as I can get). These ballparks will be permanent, and have enough seats to handle the growth of the league.

#### **Narrative**

I want to tell this story in a narrative of sorts. Something that mixes statistics with a story, but a story that OOTP creates and I embellish a bit. I want it to sound like Coover's original novel if I can find the talent within myself to do that.

I believe the "story", whether embellished from OOTP's stories, or original in its makeup, makes a league come alive. We all do this in our heads with our own leagues, but putting it down on paper is the tough part – and setting many of the details in the game to "fixed" will give me the extra time to attempt that.

For those that don't, baseball has always been my passion since I started following the Hollywood Stars in the PCL in 1956 (I was 9 years old). I played baseball using about every tabletop game made. I even played corporate baseball until I messed up my knee blocking the plate as catcher (on a day the real catcher didn't show up).

But back in 1968, when I read Coover's "The Universal Baseball Association, Inc., J.Henry Waugh, Prop." Something happened in the way I looked at baseball. I realized all these fictional characters could have a life beyond numbers on a page. Personalities COULD develop, and Coover's suggestion that a fictional world could come alive if only we put enough effort into it became a constant goal for every fictional league I created.

Sometimes I was successful, and sometimes not, but the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Coover's novel is the perfect time to recreate that world. A world where we never knew the cities these teams inhabited because knowing would connect it too closely to our real world. A world where the antics of its inhabitants were a bit outside of our "real world" experiences (remember Long Lew Lydell?). A world that was intense and fun at the same time. So, here we are. I hope on the verge of a new, captivating story of the UBA.
